

National Survey of Likely Hispanic Voters + Puerto Rican Voters

Mclaughlin and Associates conducted a bilingual survey among 1,000 likely Hispanic voters between June 5-16, 2026, with an oversample of 409 likely Puerto Rican voters, providing a total of 600 likely Puerto Rican voters.

All interviews were conducted online. The interview distribution and demographics reflect a general election turnout model.

The accuracy of 1,000 likely Hispanic voters is within +/- 3.1% at a 95% confidence interval. The accuracy of 600 likely Puerto Rican voters is within +/- 4.0% at a 95% confidence interval. The numbers in this presentation have been rounded and may not equal 100%.

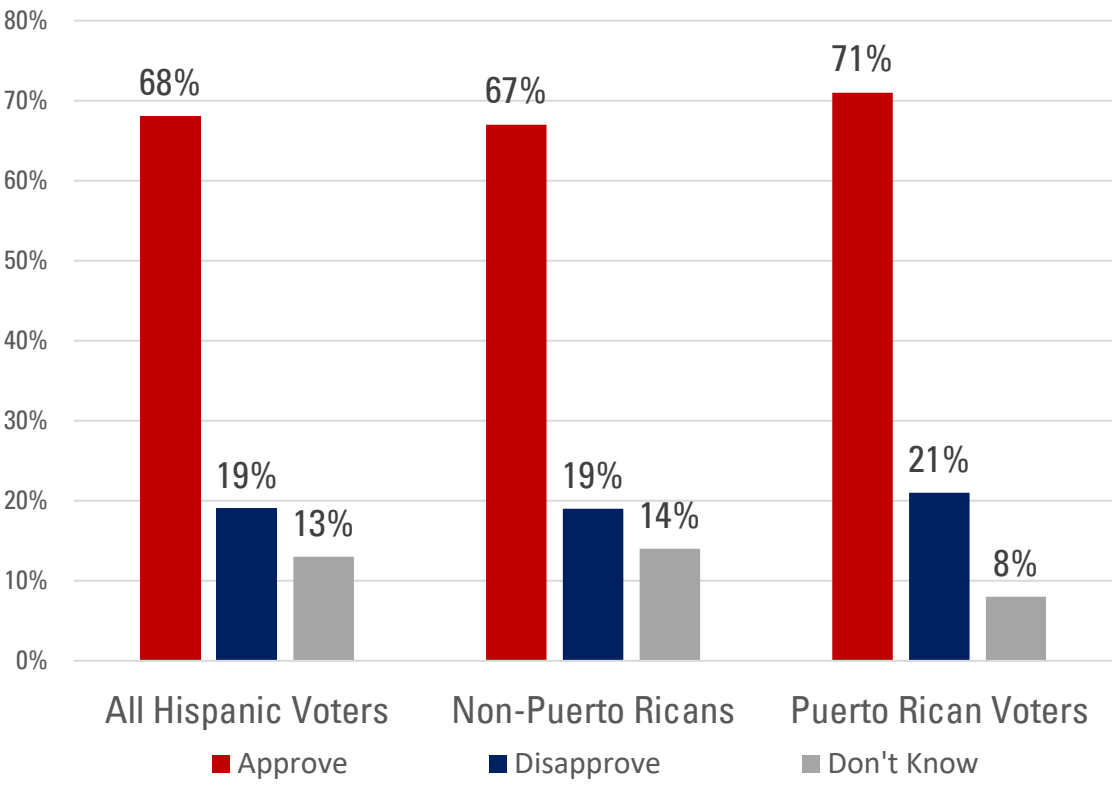

Executive Summary



Broad Support for Puerto Rico Statehood

- Over two-thirds (68% to 19%) of all Hispanics approve of Puerto Rico statehood, including 39% “strongly” approve.
- Seven in ten (71% to 21%) Puerto Ricans approve of statehood with 45% “strongly” approve.
- The broad majority support is bipartisan.
- Swing voters, including Independents, support it.



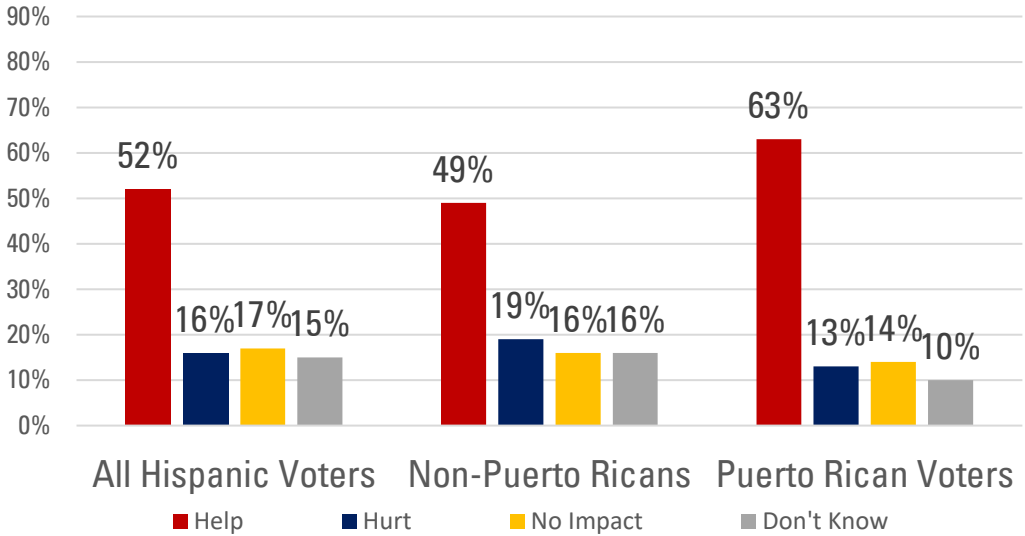
- Compared to Hispanics at-large, the support increases among key Puerto Rican voting segments in the midterm election, including Republicans, Independents, Protestants, voters under 65, and men.

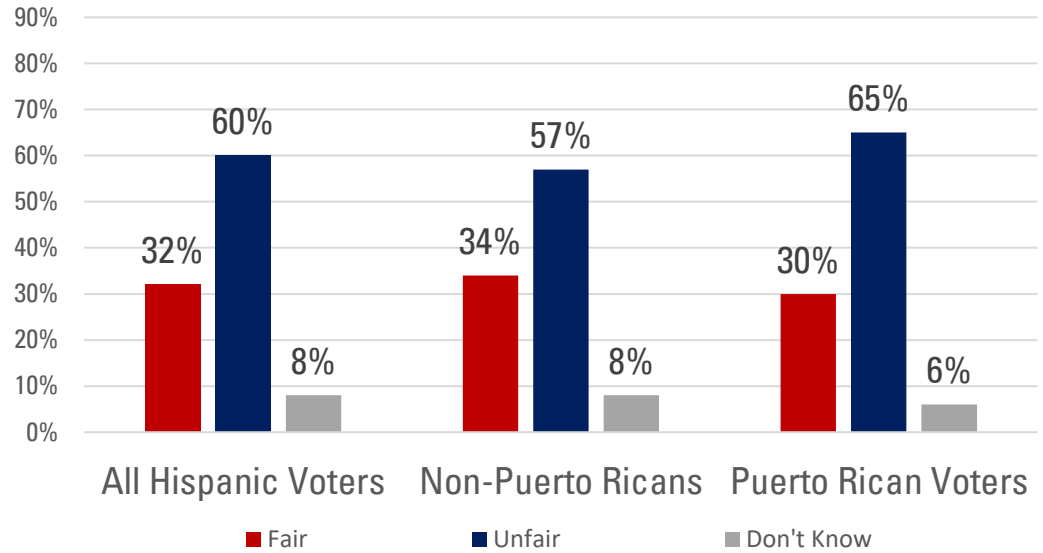
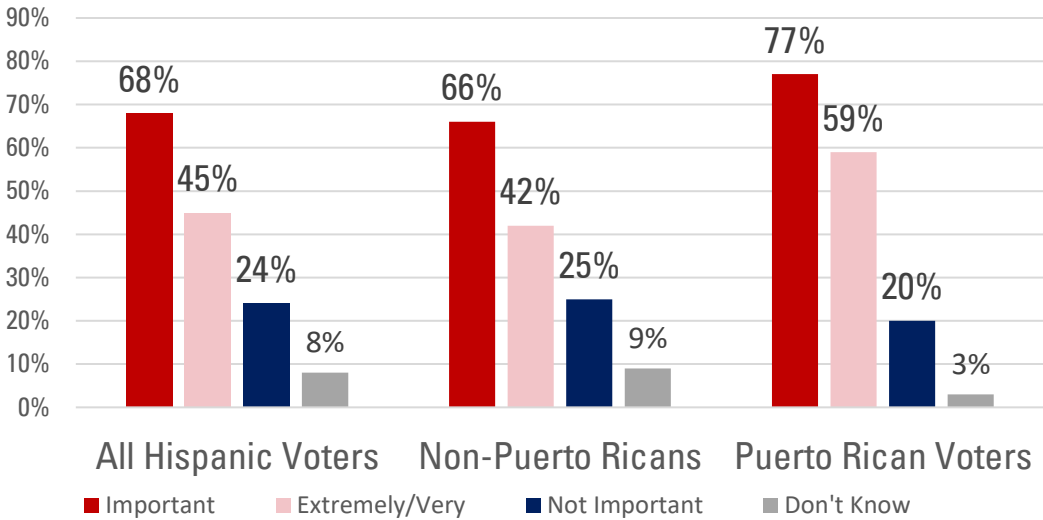
Do you approve or disapprove of Puerto Rico becoming a U.S. state?

Why Such Strong Support for Puerto Rico Statehood?

- Over two-thirds of all Hispanics (68% to 24%) say Puerto Rico statehood is important, including 45% saying it’s “extremely/very” important.
 - The level of importance increases to 77% among Puerto Ricans, including 59% who say “extremely/very” important.
- The majority (60% to 32%) of all Hispanics believe it’s unfair that Puerto Rico residents, who are U.S. citizens, have no representation in Congress and can’t vote for congress or president.
 - The perception of unfairness grows among Puerto Ricans (65% to 30%).
- The majority of all Hispanics (52%) believe Puerto Rico statehood will help the U.S. economy. Only 16% think it would hurt it.
 - Puerto Ricans are more likely to believe it would be an economic boost (63%) than a negative (13%).



Puerto Rico is a U.S. territory whose residents are U.S. citizens. How important is it to you that Puerto Rico becomes a U.S. state?

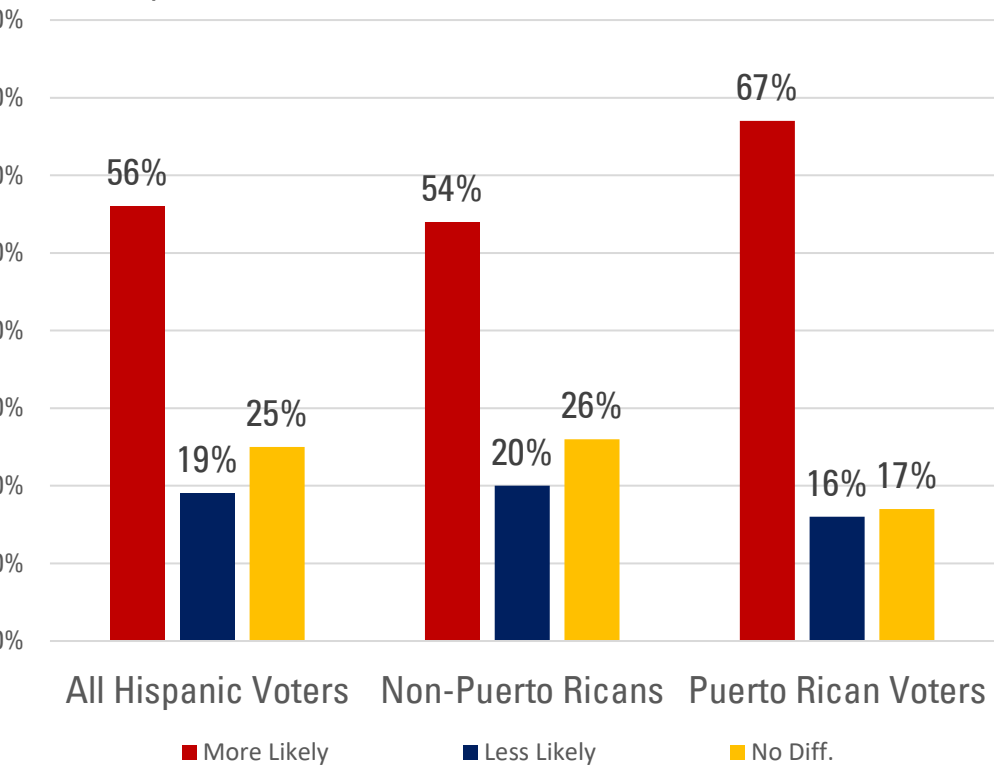


Do you believe Puerto Rico becoming a state would help or hurt U.S. economy?

Puerto Rico Statehood Provides Candidates Political Upside

- The majority (56%) of all Hispanics are more likely to vote for a candidate for congress who supports Puerto Rico statehood.
- Two-thirds (67%) of Puerto Ricans are more likely to vote for the candidate.
- It’s a winning issue that attracts voters across the political spectrum, including Independents who will decide congressional races across the country.

- Compared to Hispanics at-large, likelihood to vote for a candidate who supports Puerto Rico statehood increases among key Puerto Rican voter demographics, including Republicans, Democrats, Independents, all age groups, men and women.

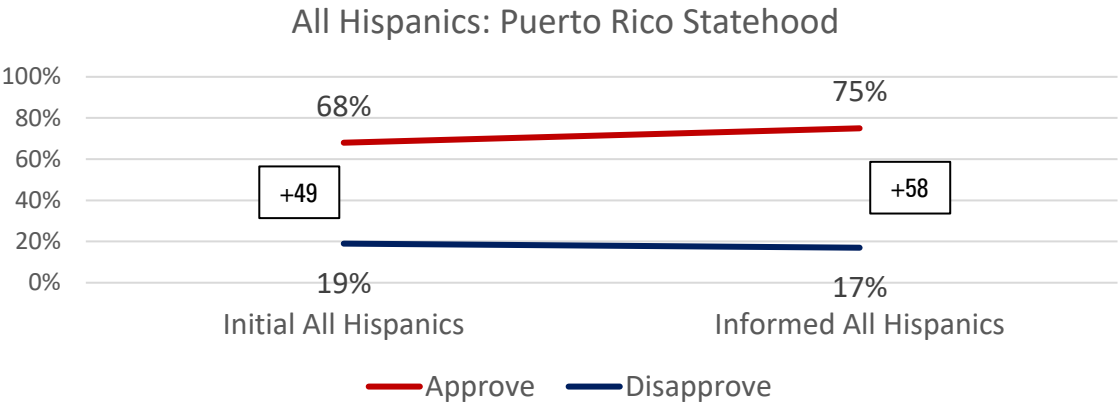
Powerful Messages Supporting Puerto Rico Statehood

- The messages make 72% up to 81% more likely to support Puerto Rico statehood among all Hispanics and 75% up to 85% among Puerto Ricans.
- The messages have intensity, reaching as high as 51% “much” more likely to vote for the candidate among all Hispanics and 59% among Puerto Ricans.

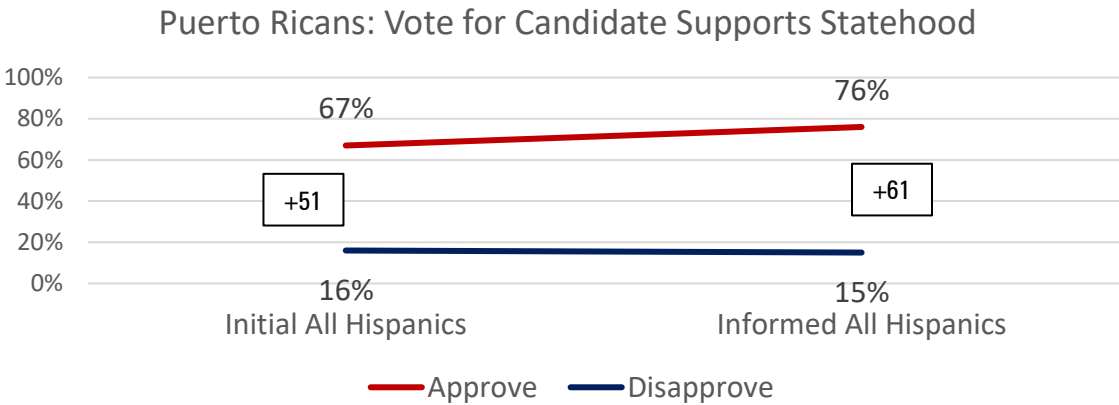
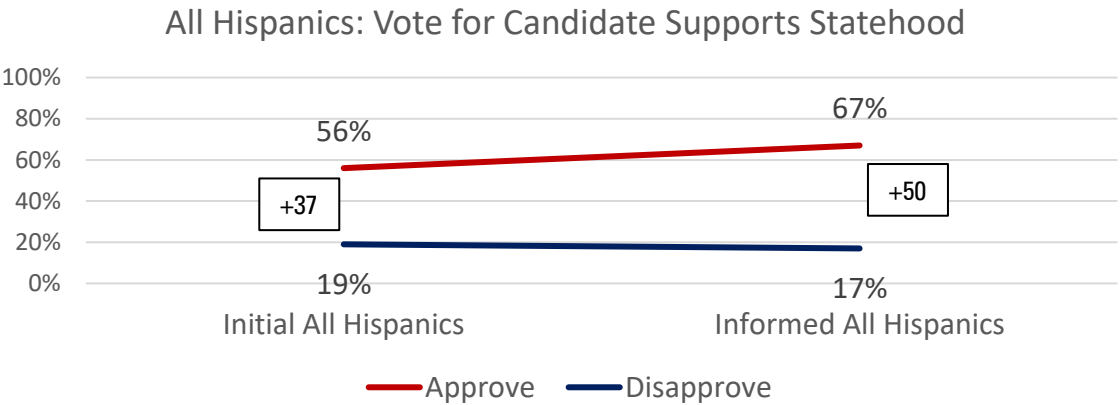
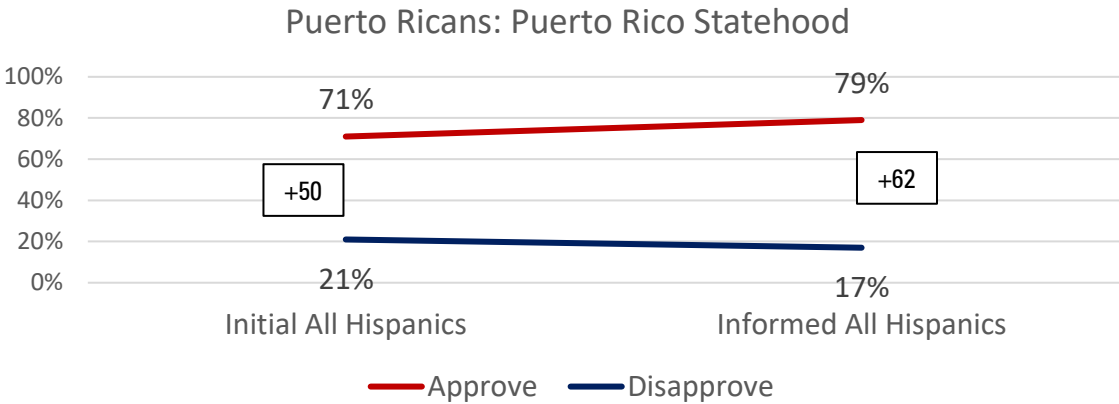

Messages Influenced Opinions

- **Puerto Rico Statehood Approval:**
 - **All Hispanics Approval:** Increased 68% to 75% (+7)
 - **All Hispanics Net:** Increased +49 to +58 (+9)
 - **Puerto Ricans Approval:** Increased 71% to 79% (+8)
 - **Puerto Ricans Net:** Increased +50 to +62 (+12)



- **Vote for Candidate Who Supports Puerto Rico Statehood:**
 - **All Hispanics More Likely:** Increased 56% to 67% (+11)
 - **All Hispanics Net:** Increased +37 to +50 (+13)
 - **Puerto Ricans More Likely:** Increased 67% to +76% (+9)
 - **Puerto Ricans Net:** Increased +51 to +61 (+10)



Statehood Approval Comparison

- Puerto Rico statehood is popular among all Hispanics, including Puerto Ricans and non-Puerto Ricans.
- Conversely, statehood for Cuba is a net negative.
 - **All Hispanic Approval:** 38% to 48% (-10)
 - **Non-Puerto Rican Approval:** 37% to 49% (-12)
 - **Puerto Rican Approval:** 40% to 45% (-5)
- Approval for Venezuela statehood is worse.
 - **All Hispanic Approval:** 32% to 52% (-20)
 - **Non-Puerto Rican Approval:** 32% to 53% (-21)
 - **Puerto Rican Approval:** 35% to 48% (-13)

- Hispanic voters are overwhelmingly aligned on family and community values.
- All Hispanics:** Importance of values range from 71% up to 92%, including intensity of 60% up to 81% “extremely/very” important.
- Puerto Ricans:** Importance of values range from 71% up to 94%, including intensity of 59% up to 81% “extremely/very” important.

Affordability Is a Major Priority & Concern

- Two-thirds of all Hispanics (64%) and Puerto Ricans (65%) are economic issue voters.
 - The driving factor is inflation and cost of living as the number one priority among all Hispanics (38%) and Puerto Ricans (41%).
- The two biggest cost of living burdens impacting the majority of Hispanics are housing and groceries.
 - All Hispanics:** housing (29%) and groceries (28%).
 - Puerto Ricans:** groceries (31%) and housing (28%)

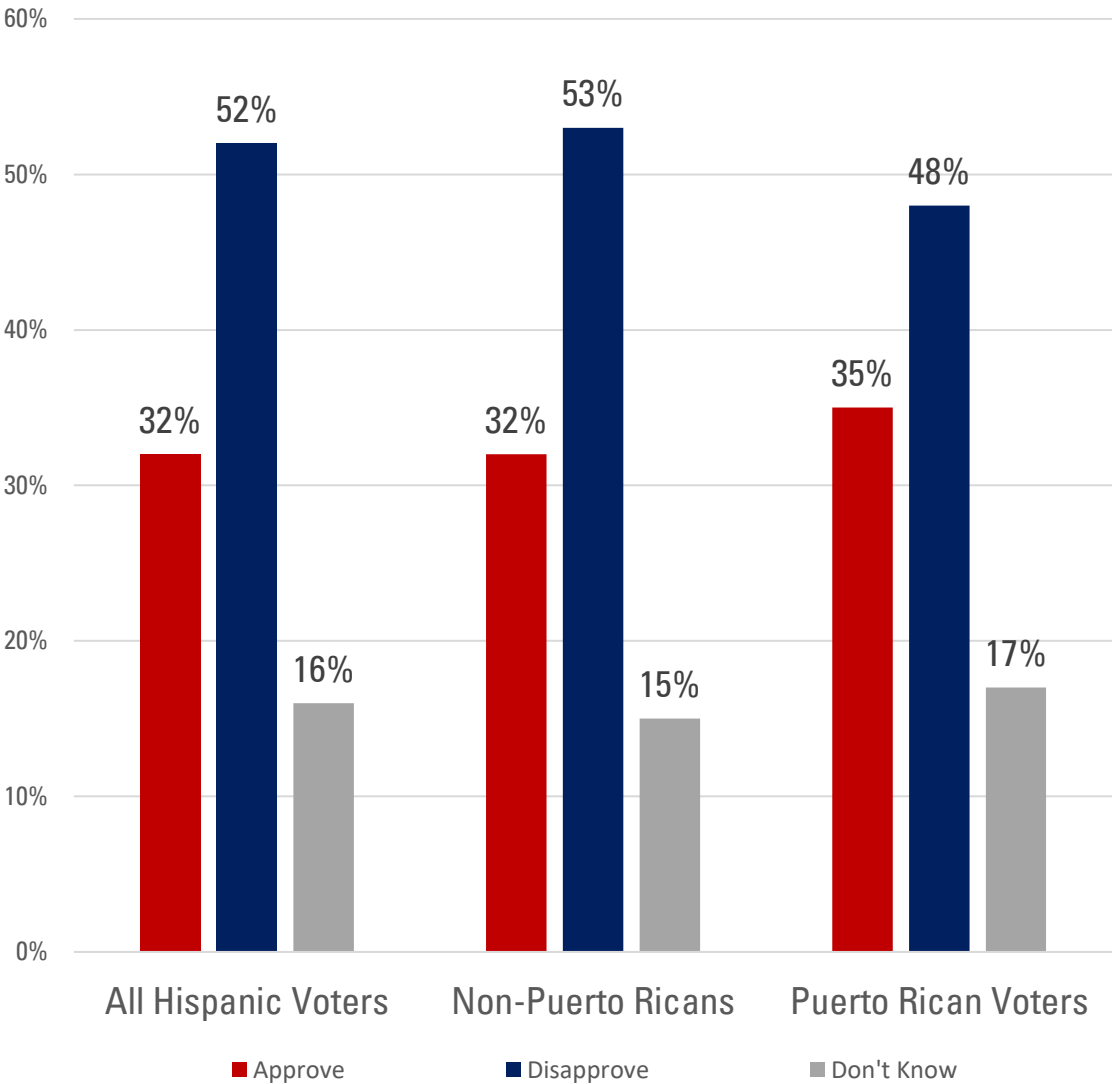
Do you approve or disapprove of **Puerto Rico** becoming a U.S. state?

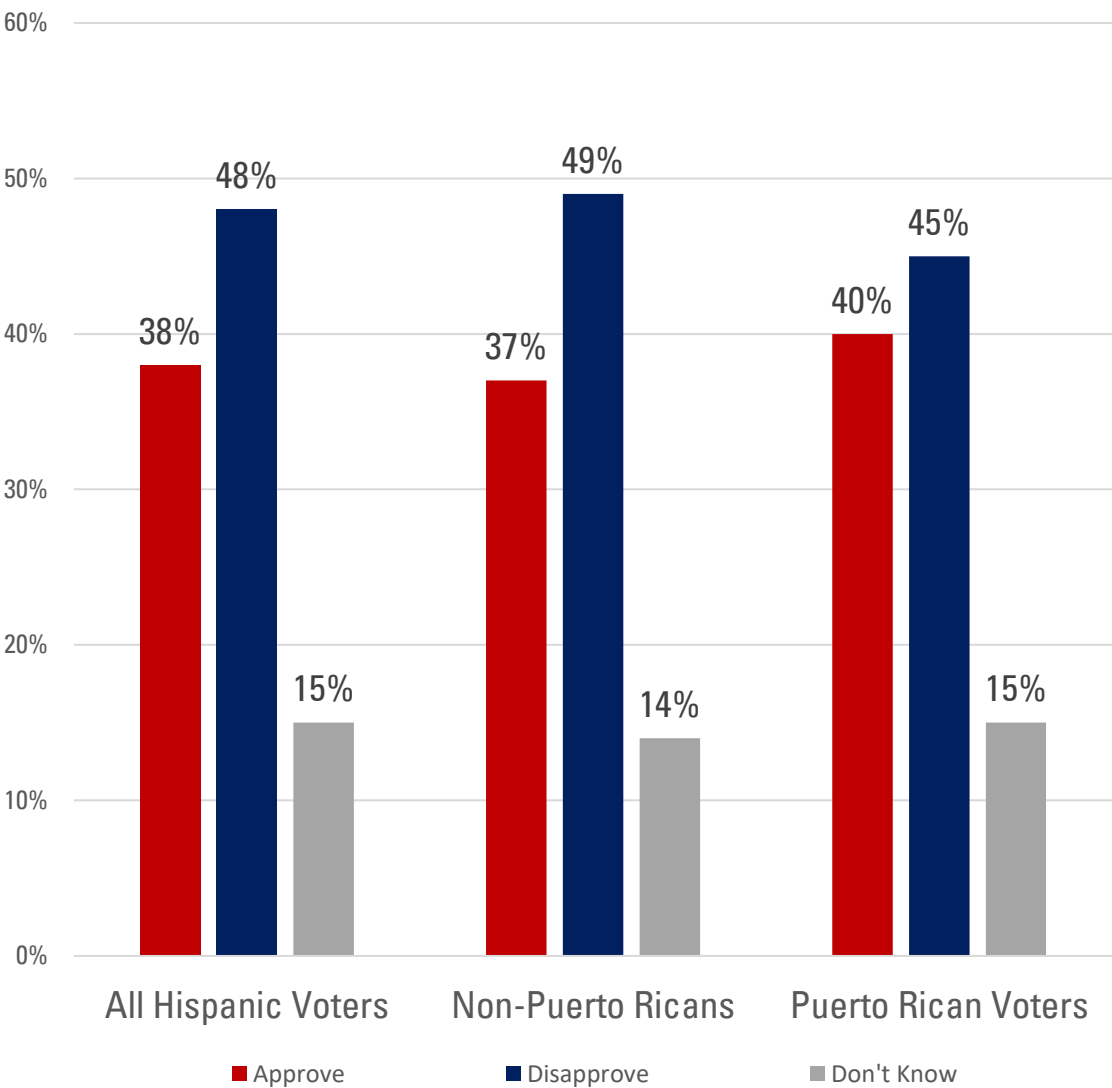
Do you approve or disapprove of **Venezuela** becoming a U.S. state?

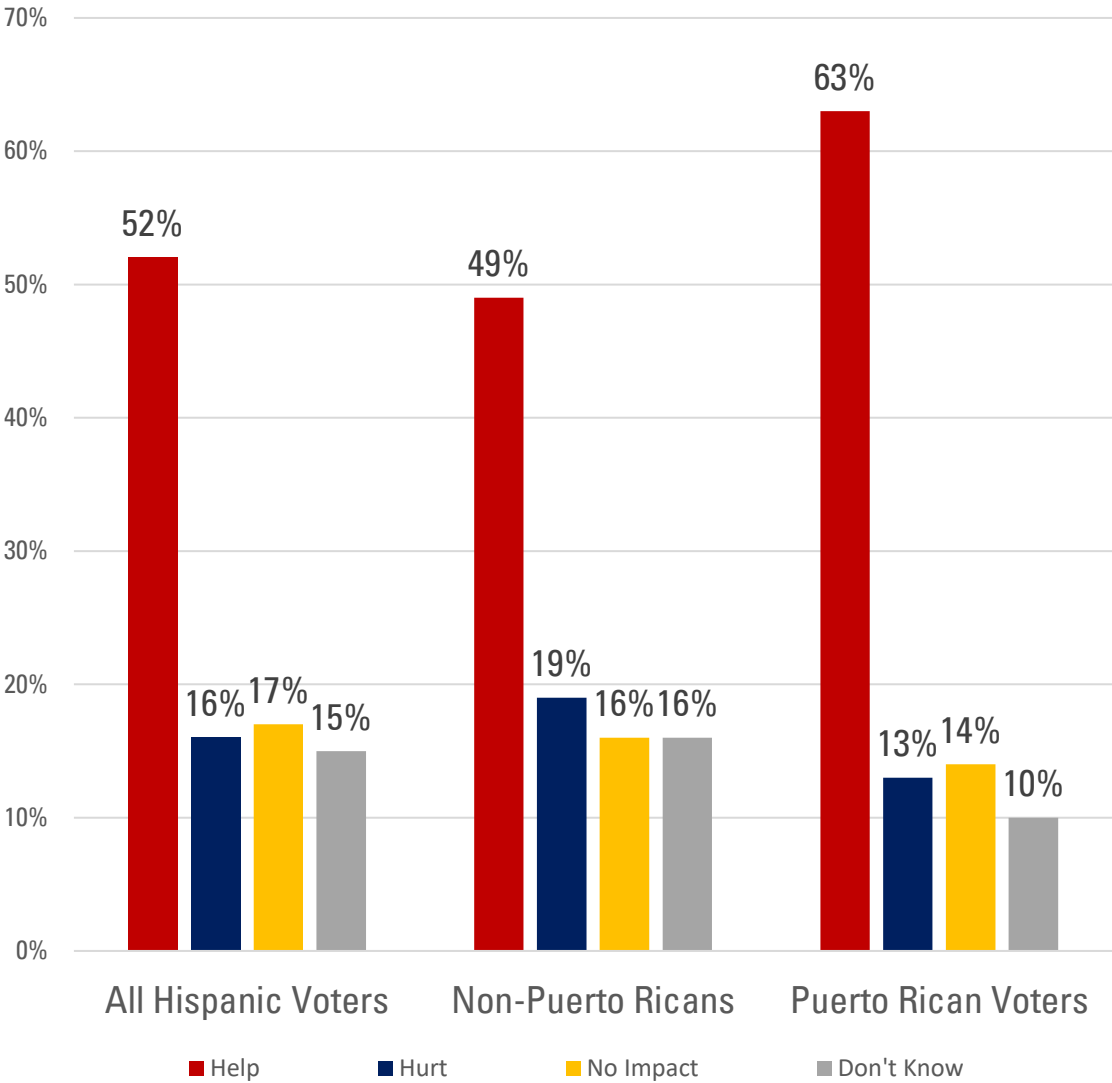
Do you approve or disapprove of Cuba becoming a U.S. state?

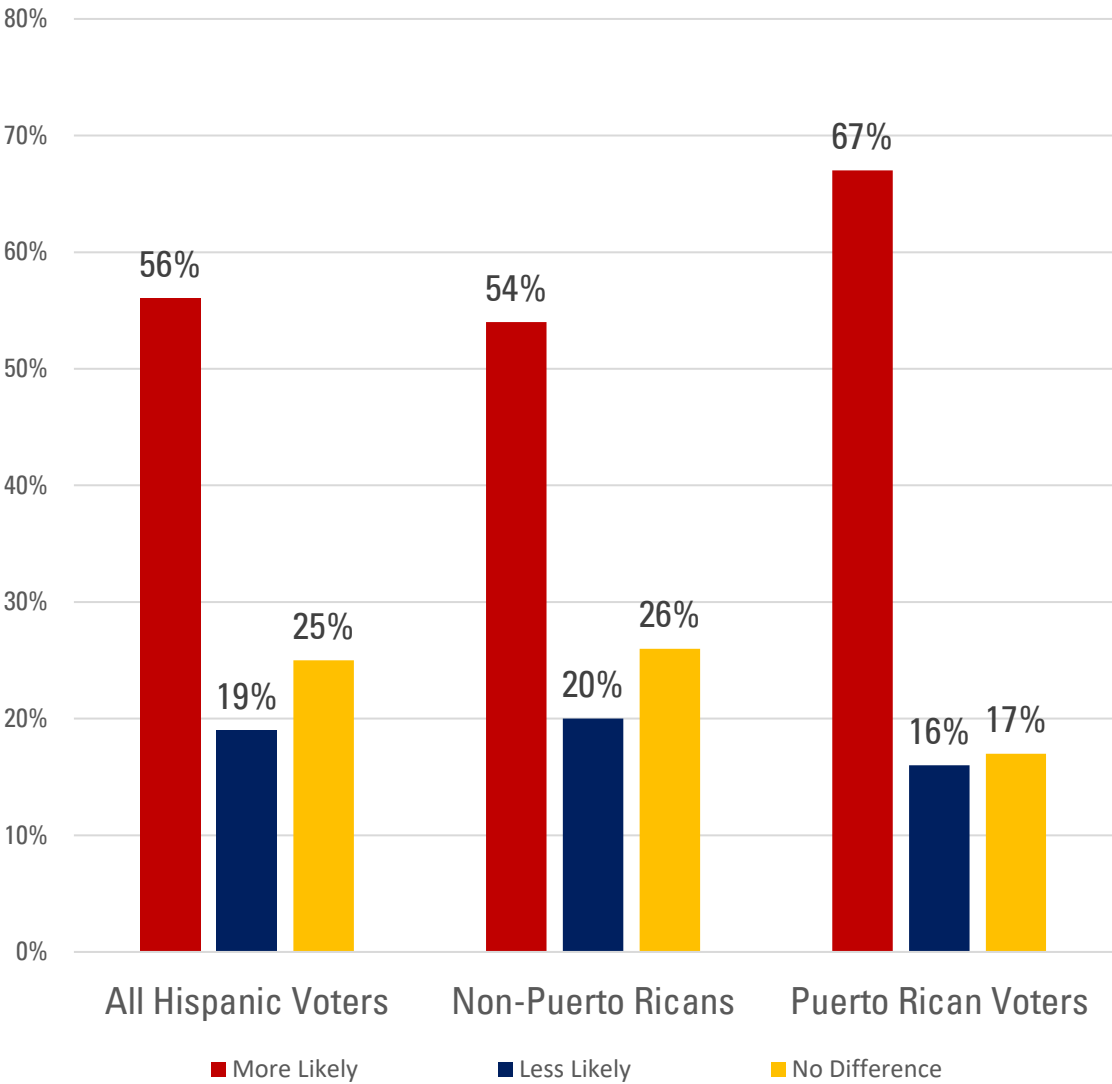
Do you believe Puerto Rico becoming a state would help or hurt U.S. economy?

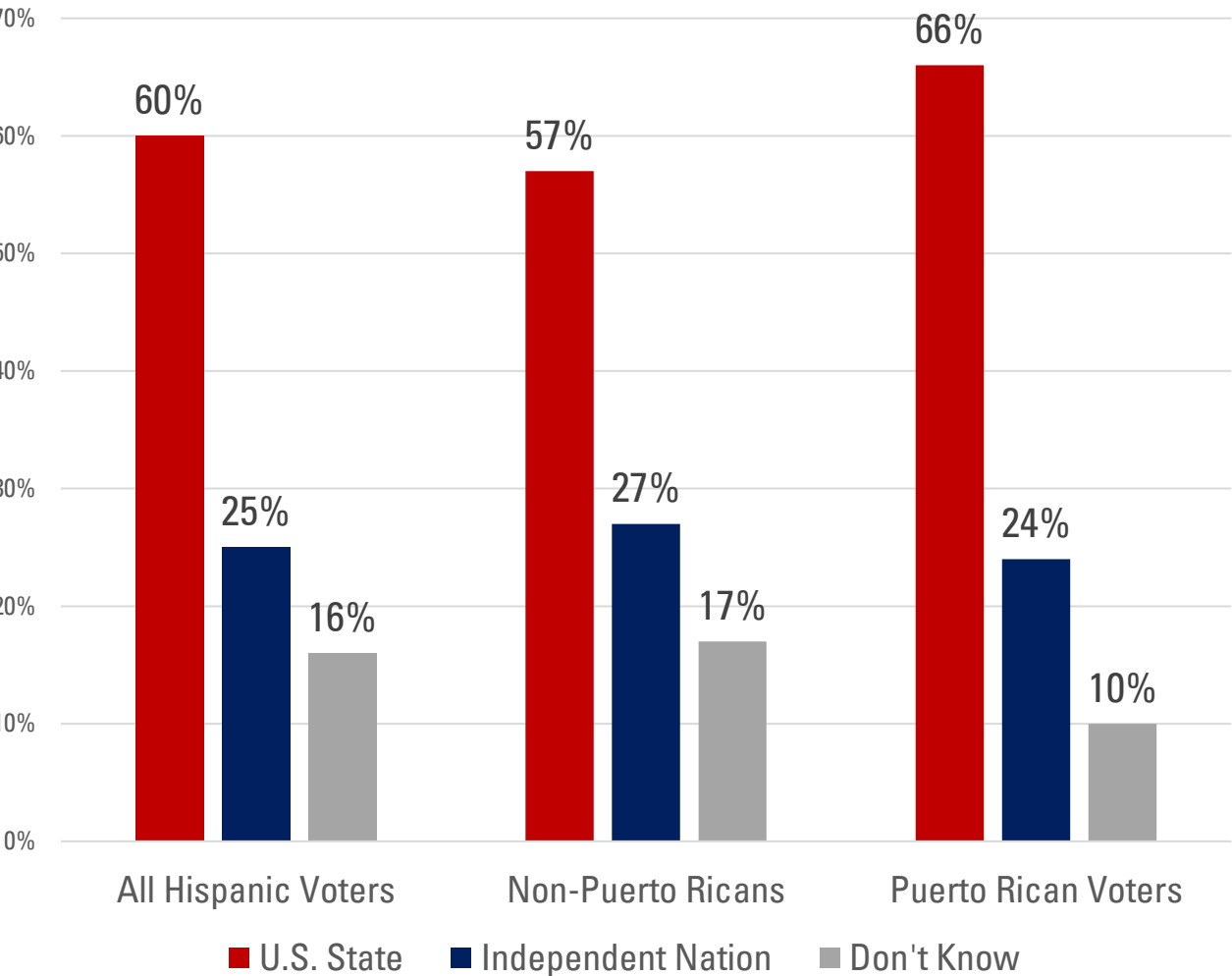
Are you more likely or less likely to vote for a candidate for Congress who supports Puerto Rico becoming a U.S. state?

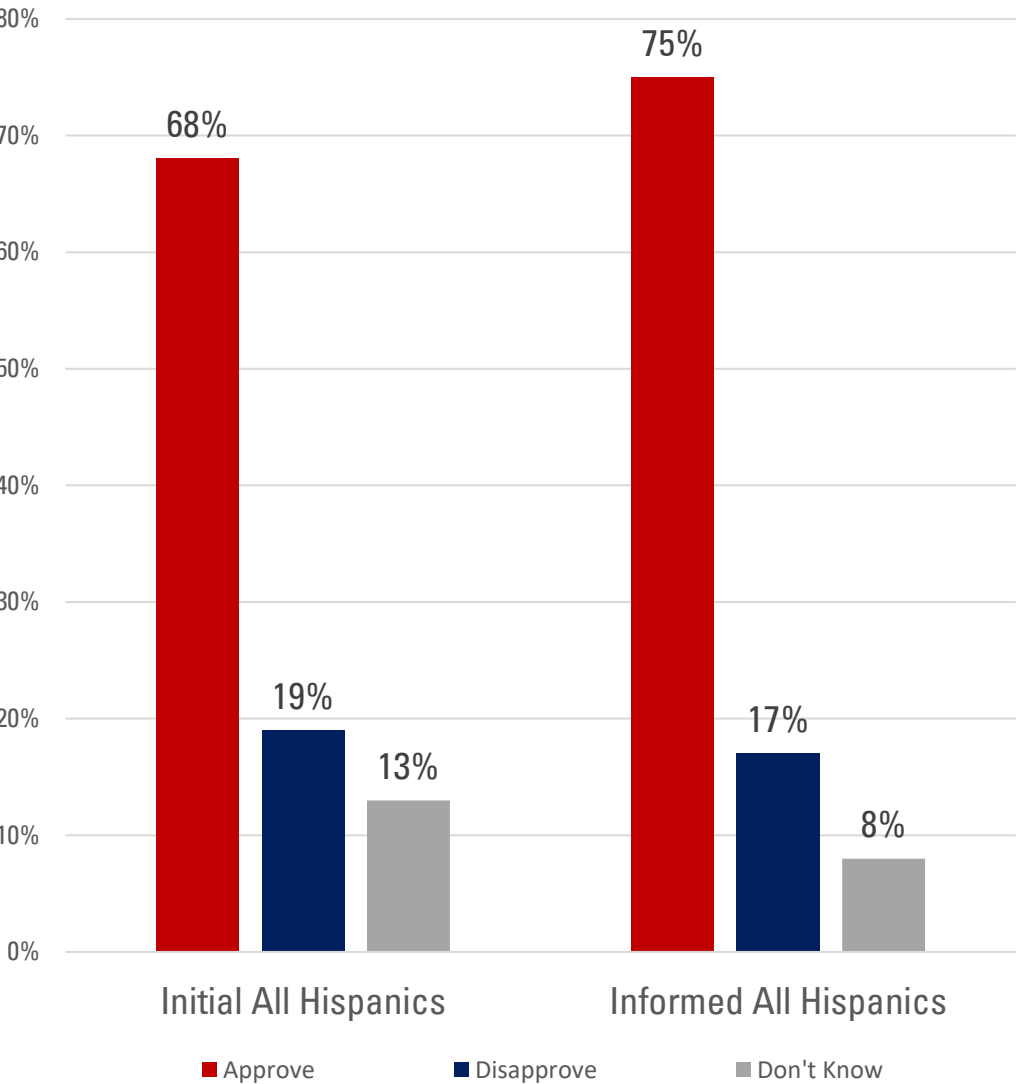

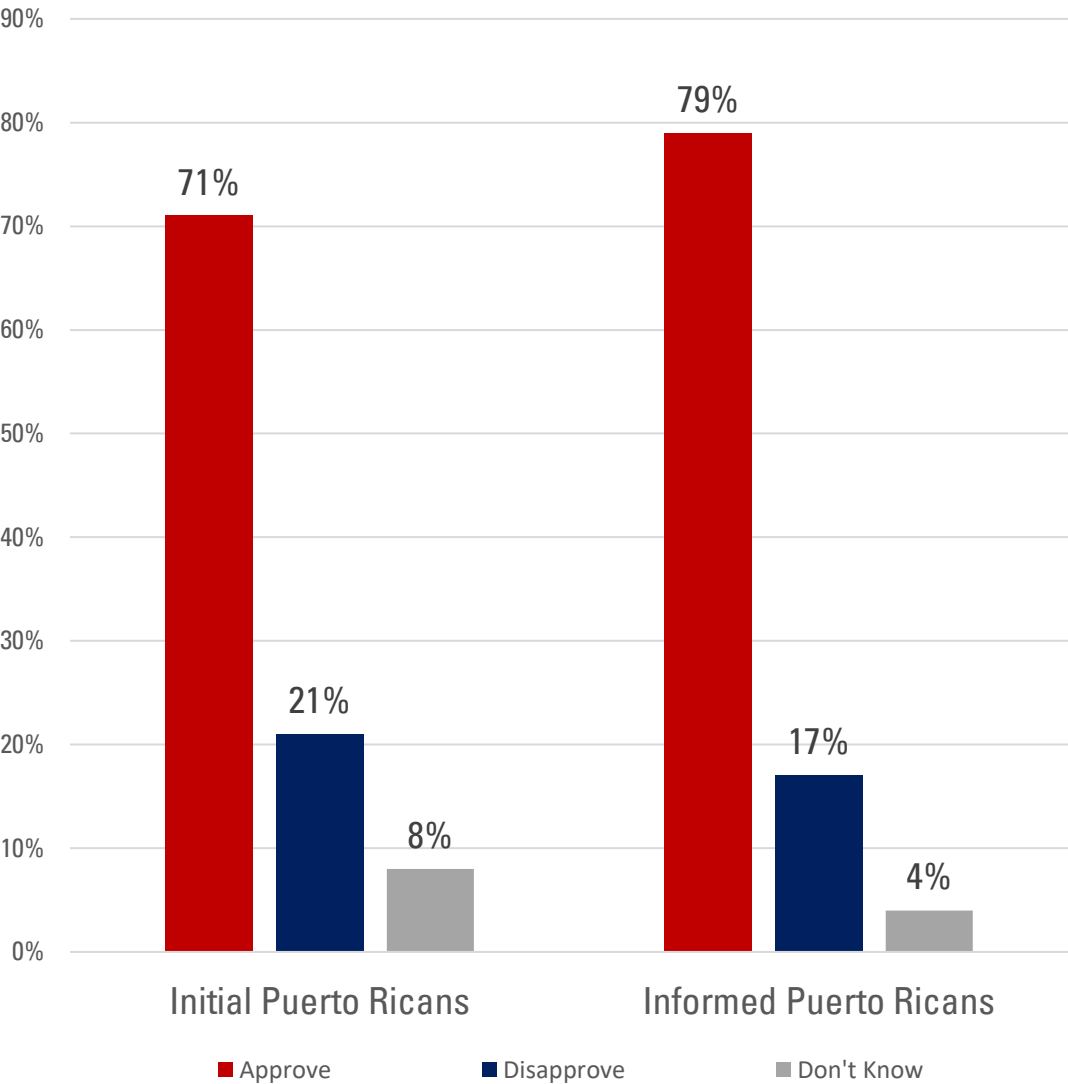

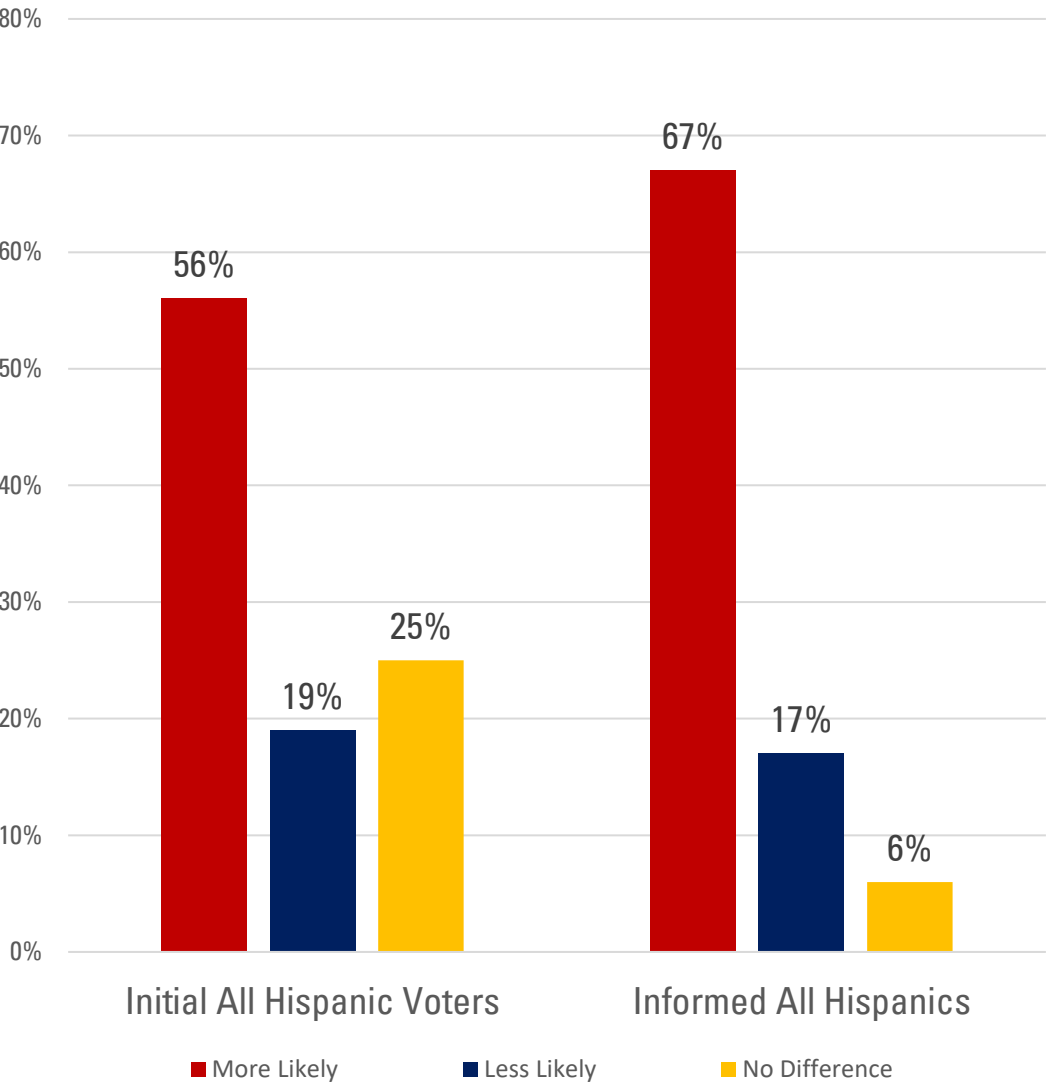
PUERTO RICANS: Based on what you learned, do you approve or disapprove of Puerto Rico becoming a U.S. state?

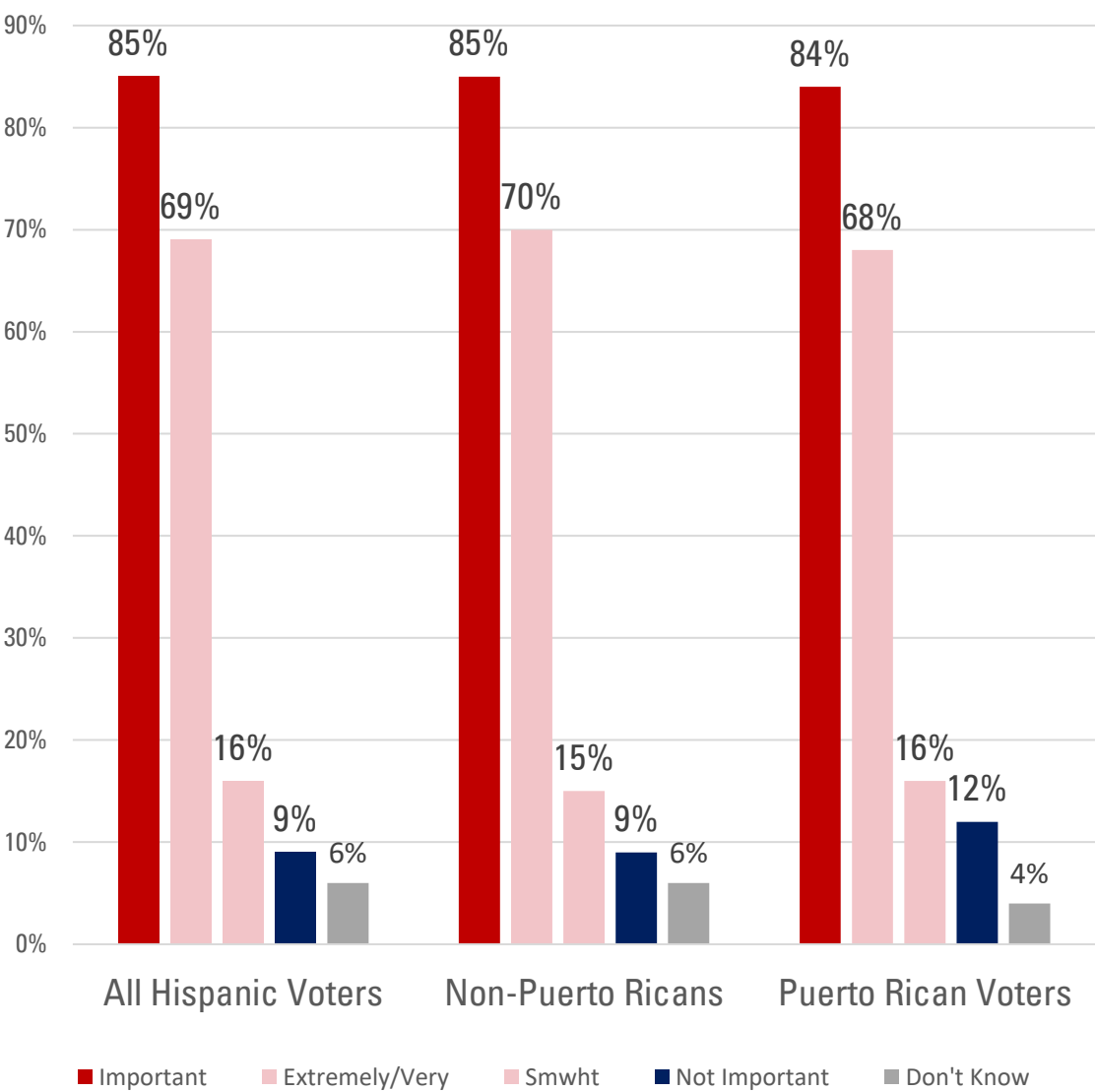

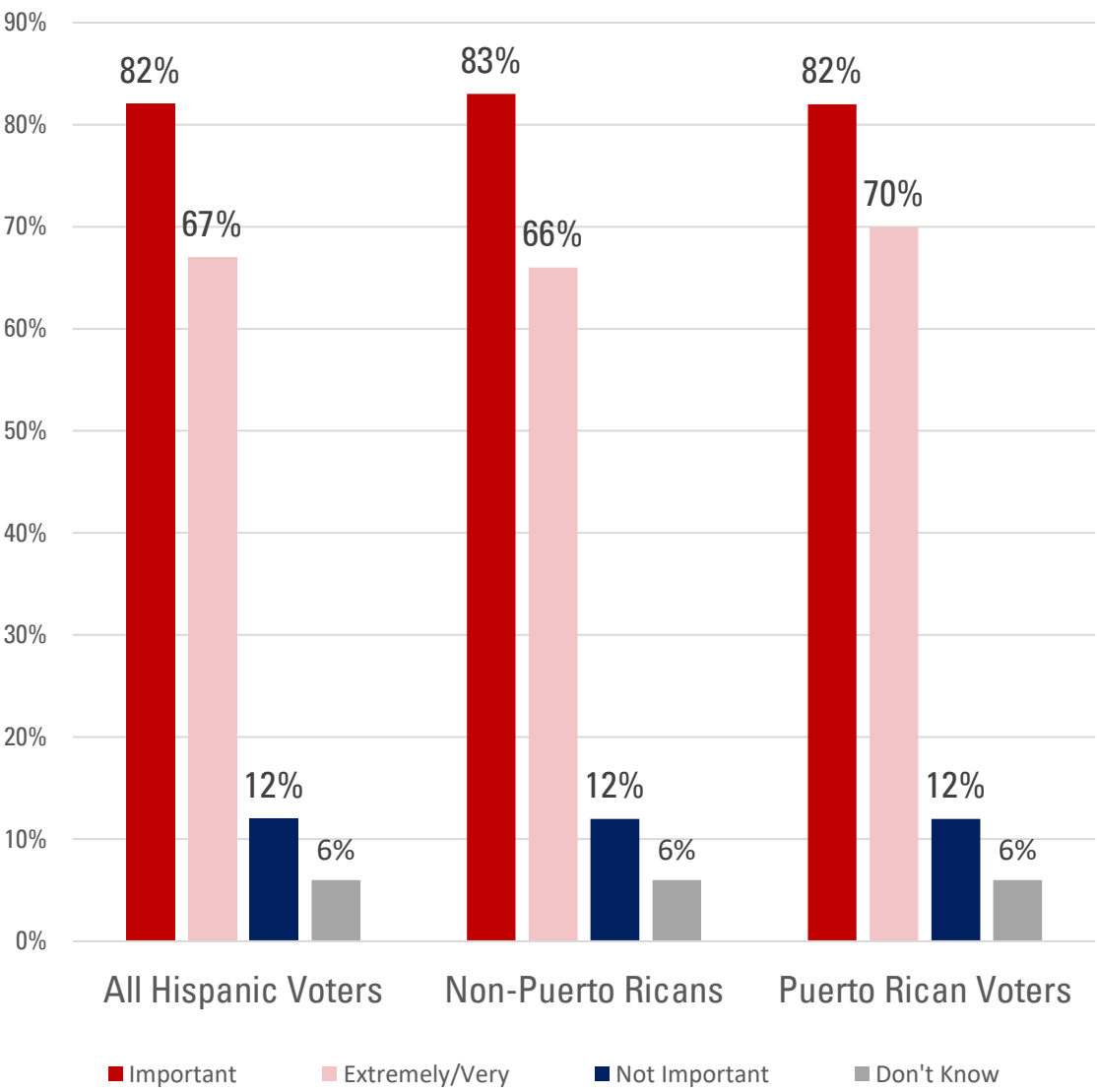
